Programme Highlights

Carpentry

We have continued to build our knowledge of carpentry in early childhood and have introduced some additional tools and resources into this learning space. Although some tools are proving a little challenging to use, particularly for our younger children, we have introduced some additional resources such as cork, vinyl and carpet that have been valuable as children experiment with our new tools. Further sources of soft wood to support this learning space would be appreciated.

Imaginative Play

Many children are engaging in imaginative play and using dress ups to support this play. Baby tigers and zombies are a popular feature in children's play along with role playing doctors, families, shops and workplaces. Working from home has exposed children to what whanau do at work and we are seeing these experiences being replicated in our children's play.

Exploring Ice

We have been providing the with multiple children opportunities to explore the sensory properties of ice within their play. Playing with ice provides children with the opportunity to observe how ice behaves when exposed to different materials and temperatures such as water, salt and heat. Using their sense of touch children can explore the properties of ice discovering that it is cold, smooth and melts when held in their hand. We have also used larger pieces of ice to provide challenges for breaking ice using a variety of tools to access what is hidden inside. This particular activity required some problemsolving skills and great perseverance.

Using ice as a sensory resource at kindy is always a popular choice for children and something that you can very easily replicate at home.



Cultural Celebrations

Many cultural celebrations have been explored this month as we have celebrated Easter, Songkran, St Georges Day and Anzac Day. Exploring different cultures, beliefs and perspectives is an important part of our curriculum. Through these experiences our children are developing a respect for different cultures and learning about the traditions costumes, and beliefs that are important to

their friends. We have celebrated with fun activities, crafts, the sharing of stories and traditions and the baking of traditional foods.

Thank you for those families who have been involved in these celebrations and shared knowledge and resources with us. We encourage all of our families to share their cultures with us to continue to build our knowledge together as a community.
